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## Geologists or The Legend of Purgatory Chasm.

In the town of Sutton, is Purgatory Chasm State Reservation. Geologists say that the 70-foot chasm was carved approximately 14,000 years ago when a massive

tidal wave of dammed-up water was released from a towering glacier. The sheer force of the gushing water was enough to tear

cleanly through the rock in one fell swoop. It resembles a wound from the world's largest hatchet creating smooth, straight walls and a chasm. That's the scientific explanation for this geological wonder.

According to legend, an Algonquin Indian woman found herself in a tight spot

shortly after she killed a white colonial settler. As she walked away from the scene of the crime, she encountered another settler who

asked for her company on a short walk. Naturally, having just murdered one of his people, she was apprehen-

sive and tried to run away.

He lunged and grabbed her by the wrist.

When she called out to the Native American god Hobomoko to save her, the second settler revealed himself as none other than Hobomoko in the flesh. Morphing into a devil-like guise, Hobomoko grabbed his captive by the waist and flew to Purgatory Chasm.

Colonists said that the devil's actions on that day formed the chasm. The deep depressions were allegedly

the places he stomped and threw his victim. The large, deep cuts in the rocks were from a tomahawk.

The colonists said that it was Hobomoko's actions on that day formed the chasm, but historians argue that the settlers had ulterior motives. Creating the story may have been part of their attempt to convert the Native Americans to Christianity by demonizing one of their gods and instilling fear. The parable also created a handy warning against attacking settlers.

Now, Purgatory Chasm State Reservation is a popular hiking and picnic spot for tourists and local families. The chasm itself can be entered by visitors – if they are slender enough. One particular area of the gorge is known as Fat Man's Misery!

The park includes hiking trails, indoor washrooms, a visitor's center, an eating area, an impressive playground, and even a food truck that parks nearby. The chasm itself is a bit of a hike into the woods and includes a good deal of climbing and

trying to reach the 1/4 mile long gorge, so be sure to wear proper hiking shoes and bring plenty of water along.

However you choose to explain its origin, Purgatory Chasm is still a magnificent geological wonder. It has inspired novels (Steve Ulfelder's Purgatory Chasm), poems (Susan Edmonds Richard's collection, titled Purgatory Chasm), and even a song (Neptune's Car's Lover's Leap: The Purgatory Chasm Song).

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frican American history month actually grew from an event called "Negro History Week" which was the brainchild of noted historian Carter G. Woodson and other prominent African Americans.

The story of Black History Month started in 1915. Harvard historian Carter G. Woodson and prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History, an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by Black Americans and other people of African descent.

The group started Negro History Week in 1926, choosing the second week of February to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

With the arrival of the civil rights movement in the late 1960s and a growing awareness of black identity, Negro



History Week evolved into Black History Month on many college campuses. President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976. Since then, every American president has designated February as Black History Month.

## **Special Notice: Regarding Registered Land Recording**

### **Effective January 1, 2023**

Beginning January 1, 2023, all Registered Land documents that you intend to submit to us for registration must first be emailed to us for pre-approval. Send your fully executed documents to worcester.deeds@sec.state.ma.us. We will review the documents and email our determination that the documents may be submitted to us as is or we will specify any changes that must be made before sending the documents to us.

Beginning January 1, 2023, original Registered Land documents will be returned to customers once the recording process is completed.

A return envelope with postage will be required so that we can return the documents to you via the USPS.
